POETRY HALFWAY HOUSE...

Importance of NEON WORDS!

- Tell students that you are going to DICTATE a poem to them. The poem will
 be dictated precisely, you will tell them when to use punctuation, capital
 letters and when to miss a line.
- Explain that certain words have been BLANKED out. When you come across a blanked word students are to leave a space.
- Dictate poem to students.
- Give ten minutes to insert own words (only one word per blank) into poem.
 Suggest that perhaps some of these blanks are NEON WORDS, moments of clarity within the poem...
- Read poem again, go around room asking for words as you reach blanks.
- Once finished, read poem, this time with original words added.

 Looking at idea that a single word can alter the direction of a poem, create a different meaning.
