<u>noun</u>

The name of a person, place, thing or quality

e.g. *Peter; Dunedin; car;*friendship

adjective

A word which describes a noun or pronoun

e.g. <u>red</u> rose; <u>rainy</u> day;

the biggest slice of pizza

verb

A doing, being or having word

e.g. I <u>like eating</u> pizza.

He was here.

They <u>have</u> P.E. now.

adverb

A word which adds meaning to a verb by telling:

How? When? Where?

e.g. She sang <u>sweetly</u>. He left <u>early</u>. They ran <u>away</u>.

pronoun

A word used instead of a noun: I me we us you he she it they him her them

possessive pronouns

my mine our ours your yours her hers his its their theirs

NB: <u>no</u> apostrophe!

conjunction

A word that joins words or groups of words

and if but as through yet because although for

e.g. bread and butter

preposition

A word which shows the connection between a noun/pronoun and the other words in the sentence e.g. The hamburger was on the plate

alliteration

The use of the same initial consonant sound in words close together e.g. Marvellous mouthwatering melting moments (You hear the enjoyment - mmm!)

<u>assonance</u>

An internal rhyme where the same <u>vowel</u> sounds are used within words which are close together

e.g. *A stitch in t<u>i</u>me saves n<u>i</u>ne*

<u>onomatopoeia</u>

The <u>sound</u> of a word reflects its meaning

e.g. splat whoosh zoom squeak hiccup

<u>simile</u>

Compares one thing to another - something is *similar* to something, using <u>as</u> or <u>like</u>

- e.g. *The water was as clear as crystal.
 - *He eats like a pig.
 - *Shell-like ears.

metaphor

A comparison where one thing is said to <u>be</u> another

e.g. The wind was a torrent of darkness.

He is a pig when he eats.

personification

Non-human things are given human characteristics

e.g. The wind moaned in the trees.

Into the Mouth of Hell, into the Jaws of Death ...
