1.	write the first line, "Shall I compare you to a_(object)"
2.	next line, "Thou art more and"
	(find two adjectives related to your object)
3.	write SIX lines, (as long or as short as you like) explaining what isn't good about your object
4.	next line, "But thy eternal(nice adjective) shall not fade"
5.	write FOUR lines (as long or as short as you like) where you express as much love as
	possible for your object.
6.	Finish with the following two lines,
"Sc	long as men can breathe or eyes can see,
So	long lives this, and this gives life to thee."
