Facilitating Global Development Dialogues to Increase Access to Learning in Developing Countries

## **INTRODUCTION**

In 2004, UTech was officially awarded an affiliate status of the World Bank's Global Development Learning Network (GDLN), to be part of the global collaboration of multi-channel ICT network of distance learning centers with a mandate to facilitate dialogues on development issues. UTech is also the first centre in the English-speaking Caribbean to be recognized as a GDLN affiliate, and has continued to represent this language grouping within the GDLN.

The University has hosted several cross-border development dialogues by means of interactive videoconferencing on topics including HIV/AIDS, Disability Issues, Prevention and Control of Chronic Disease, Physicians and Elderly Care, Medical Research Ethics, Caribbean Growth and Competitiveness, Anti-Money Laundering and Financial Terrorism. These dialogues have been sponsored by international funding agencies such as the Netherlands Government, Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), UNAIDS, UNESCO and the World Bank. There has been a wide diversity of stakeholders including policy-makers, government ministers, non-government organizations, private sector representatives, universities, community colleges, the general public and specific interest groups including infected persons. For most dialogues, participants were drawn from African or Latin American countries such as Ghana, Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda, Brazil, Costa Rica, Chile, Dominican Republic, Mexico, Panama; with Anglo-Caribbean counterparts from Barbados, St. Kitts, St. Lucia, Trinidad & Tobago, Jamaica and the United States of America. The dialogues reflected non-formal and non-traditional approaches to education and facilitating increased access to learning for marginalized and minority groups.

## Background to The GDLN

The GDLN (<a href="http://www.gdln.org">http://www.gdln.org</a>) is a World Bank initiative that has created world-wide partnership of distance learning centers (GDLN Affiliates) and other public, private and non-governmental organizations committed to development learning and dialogue for lasting poverty reduction. Offering a unique combination of distance learning technologies and methods, the GDLN facilitates timely and cost-effective knowledge sharing, consultation, coordination and training.

Through GDLN, individuals, groups and organizations design and deliver courses, seminars and other activities that address the full range of development issues. GDLN Centres around the world have facilities for interactive videoconfercing, web-based learning, and face-to-face interaction and also offer logistical support and facilitation services. These Centres provide cost-effective, fast and high-impact alternatives to traditional meetings and course, enabling people around the world ot connect with each other, without having to travel overseas.

#### **The Proposed Demonstration**

For the PCF5 in 2008, UTech is proposing to facilitate a two-hour collaborative session by inviting representatives of four Commonwealth countries with GDLN centers to participate in the practical demonstration of a development dialogue. The primary aims would be to explore first-hand the advantages of the GDLN for reaching large numbers of stakeholders across geo-physical and cultural distances; and to briefly share experiences/lessons learnt from previous GDLN dialogues held on the major Forum themes.

The ultimate aim is to facilitate a discussion of best practices of both the content and methodology of interactive videoconferencing as a strategy for increasing access to knowledge and skills and influencing attitudes. These best practices would include

- Partnerships among tertiary institutions for global learning
- Innovative approach in networking to maximize economies of scale... for connectivity and knowledgesharing
- · Sharing the richness of content resources already existing

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 Quality Assurance in content design & facilitation skills – methodology & tools....for interactive videoconferencing as a learning tool

The critical requirements for this live demonstration will include access to an appropriate videoconference site at or in close proximity to the University of London. UTech is willing to approach the World Bank for technical and financial assistance in facilitating the global connections with the GDLN Centres within the select Commonwealth countries. It is anticipated that representatives of public and private sector within countries would be invited also to participate locally.

The main cost considerations include venue/facilities for hosting participants, videoconferencing network connections (ISDN or T1), multimedia equipment, event coordinators, on-site facilitators.

### TRACK RECORD

The GDLN Centre in Jamaica was launched on September 27, 2004. Over the past four years, there has been at least thirteen development dialogues covering a wide range of topics in Health, Finance & Business, Tourism, Governance
