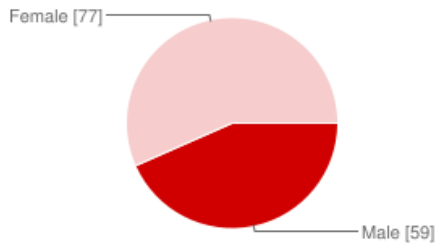

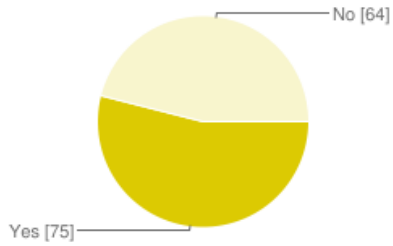

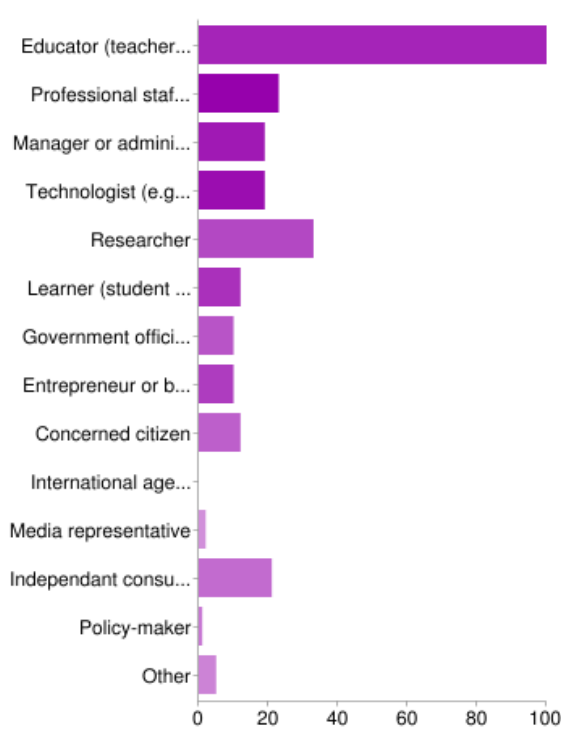
4. On a regular basis, where are you located?

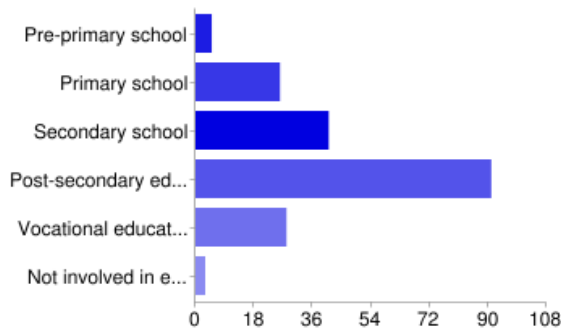

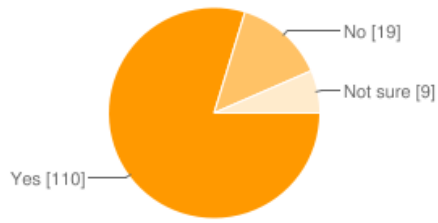
6. If your work is specifically education-related, what is your main focus?

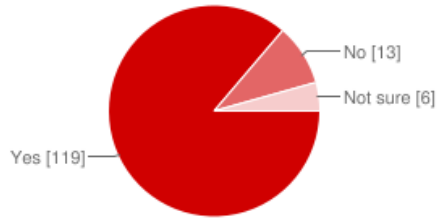

7. Prior to joining this course, did you know about the concept of "open education resources" (OER)?



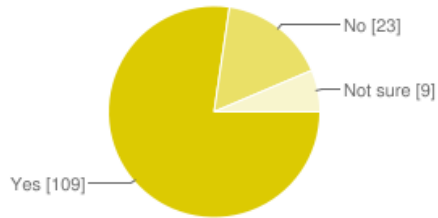

8. Prior to joining this course, did you know of Creative Commons licenses or "open content licensing"?



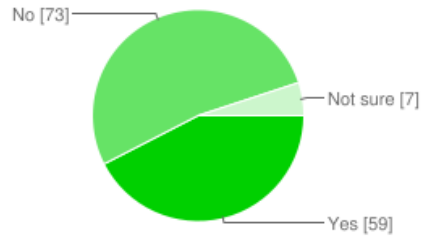

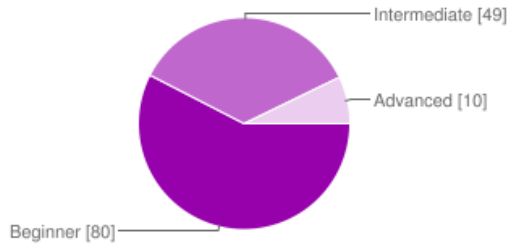

10. Have you applied a Creative Commons license to your own work before?



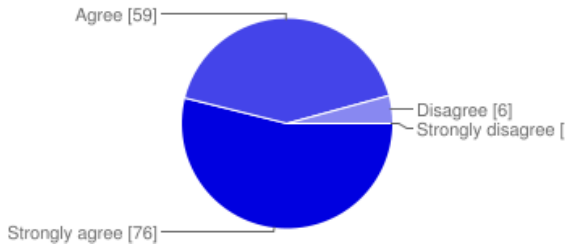

11. How would you rate your knowledge of the different Creative Commons licenses?



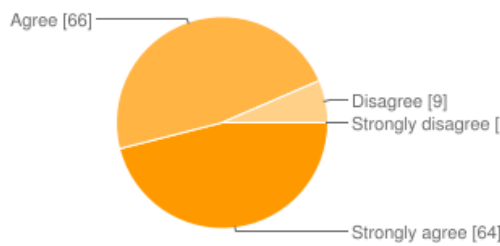

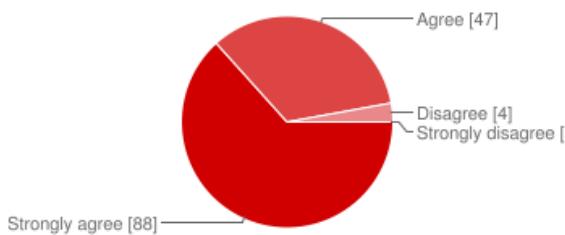

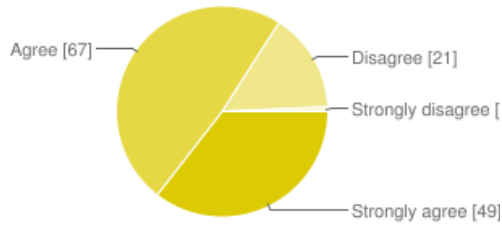

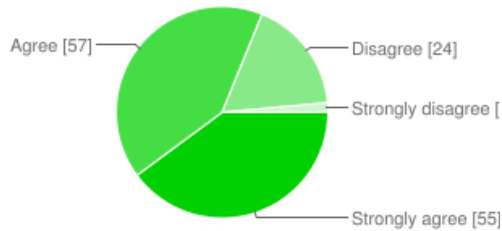

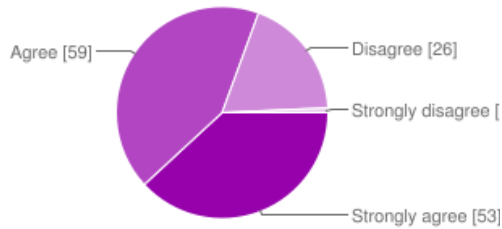

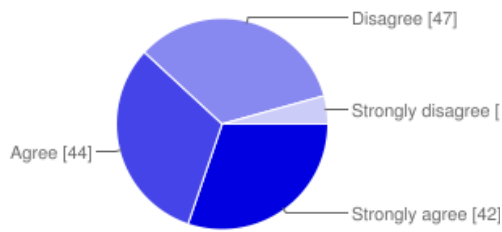

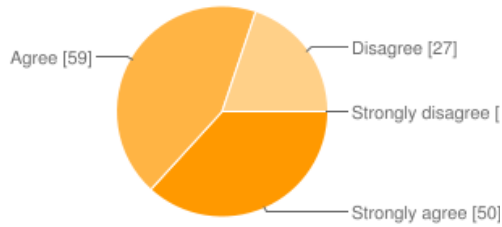

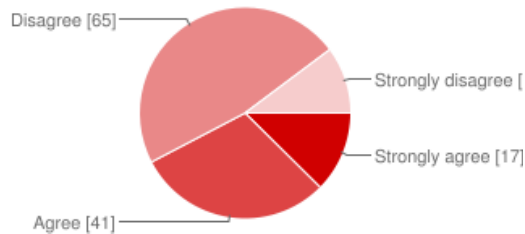

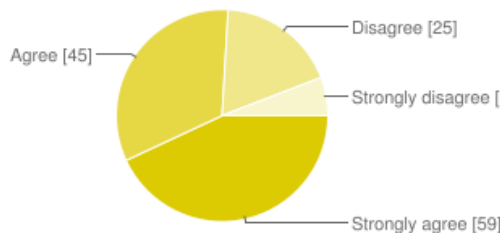

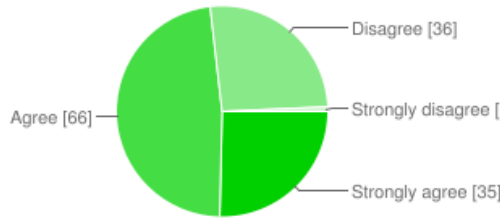

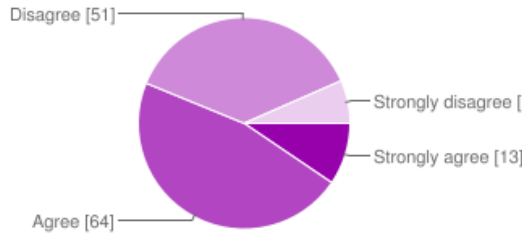

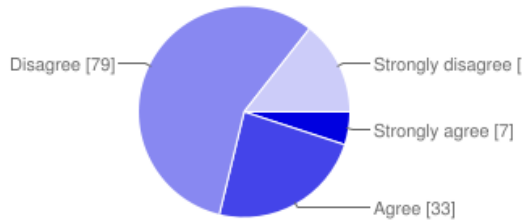

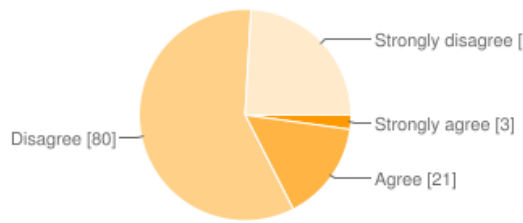

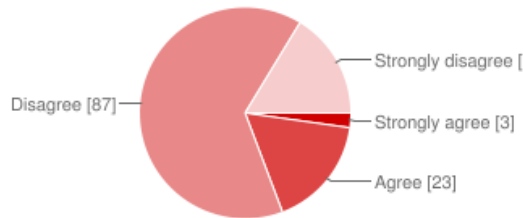

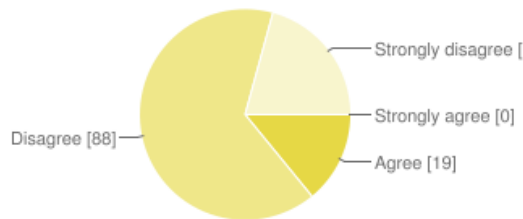

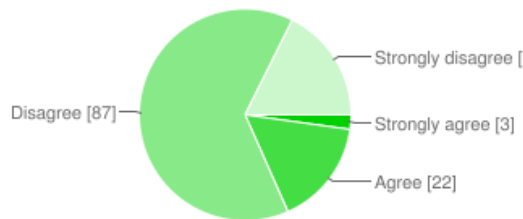

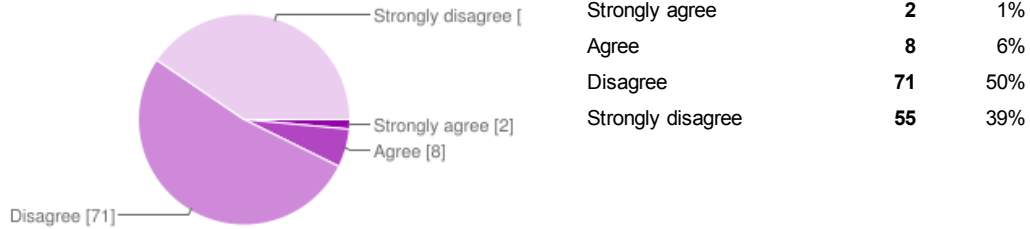

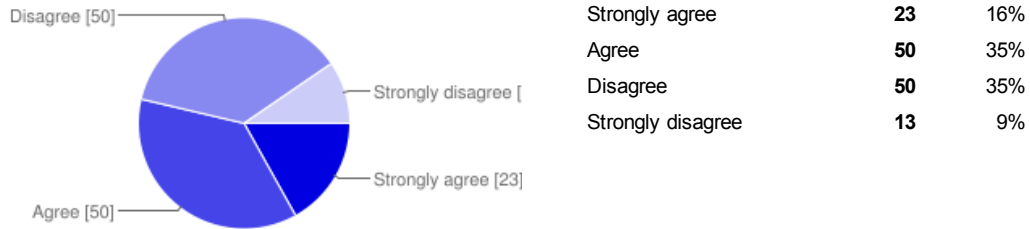

33. Further comments and suggestions can be provided below.

There is little incentive for many educators to share their resources freely on the Web. Also, 'measures' such as PBRF almost force tertiary educators, at the very least to insist on attribution...especially in a world where CC and open sharing, research, commenting, and growth are at best not understood, and at worst seen with great suspicion and a barrier to a career where attributed / original research are key drivers.
